



Comment in relation to CSO Vital Statistics Report

On today, May 29th 2015, the Central Statistics Office (CSO) released <u>provisional</u> figures for deaths, including suicide, which occurred in 2014. According to Press Release, 459 suicide deaths occurred in 2014, equating to 10 per 100,000 of the population. These <u>provisional</u> figures show a decrease of 16 deaths or 3% from the <u>provisional</u> suicide figures for 2013, of 475 deaths. Figures for 2014 also show a decrease (7% from 396 to 368) in male suicides from 2013, with males accounting for 80% of all suicide deaths in 2014. Ninety one suicide deaths in Ireland in 2014 were carried out by females.

However, these <u>provisional</u> figures by their nature are subject to change, and should therefore be interpreted with caution. The <u>provisional</u> figures always represent an underestimate of the final figures. Previous research by Corcoran *et al.* (2006) found that the final suicide figures can be 6-20% higher.

These findings underline the need to review suicide mortality recording procedures in Ireland in conjunction with prioritising the on-going implementation and evaluation of suicide prevention programmes.
