The Registry is a system of recording self-harm presentations to hospital emergency departments in Ireland.

The Registry is an integral part of *Connecting for Life*, Ireland's National Strategy to Reduce Suicide 2015-2020 and helps to improve services for those at risk of suicide and self-harm.

The Registry is operated by the National Suicide Research Foundation.

Aims of the Registry

Provide access to real time data.

Inform services, policy and interventions.

Evaluate guidelines and treatments.

Measure regional, demographic and temporal variations.



Connecting for Life

The Registry is funded by the HSE's National Office for Suicide Prevention.

Information for you

This hospital is providing data to the National Self-Harm Registry Ireland.

All cases of self-harm presenting to the emergency department are recorded in a way that preserves patient anonymity and confidentiality.

Ethical approval for the operation of the Registry has been granted by national and local ethics committees.
